Susan Kruse has been with SCHA since the beginning and recently retired as the Learning and Engagement Manager at Archaeology for Communities in the Highlands (ARCH). Susan co-founded ARCH in 2009 after a number of years as tutor with the Workers' Educational Association (WEA) facilitating student-centred heritage courses. She has led many projects investigating Highland archaeology and heritage, from earliest times to 20th century remains, and has relished the opportunity to span different periods, with indoor and outdoor projects. In addition, she has been involved in identifying and organising networking events for the heritage community in the Highlands – there are almost a hundred heritage organisations and over 50 museums and archives. One of Susan's last projects with ARCH involved training people to facilitate community heritage courses, as there is no training for people who want to focus on community heritage. In 2018 Susan was awarded an MBE for services to community archaeology in the Highlands.

Susan says 'I am a passionate supporter of community involvement, and feel very strongly that the grassroots heritage movement is undervalued and under-resourced. I was attracted to SCHA from the beginning because it seemed to me the only organisation which was focussed primarily on the grassroots, was trying to be inclusive without financial and geographical barriers, and was working to network and support the many heritage groups, researchers and projects, some of which might not consider themselves mainstream heritage. Now that I'm retired I'm still very much involved in local heritage, and am also working on a book on the campaign for women's suffrage in the Highlands. I am also of course trying to grow SCHA, and extend its regional focus.'

Glasgow Vintage Vehicle Trust

The Glasgow Vintage Vehicle Trust was formed at the end of 2002 and is based in the former Bridgeton Bus Garage at Fordneuk Street in Glasgow. The garage is now a heritage centre for buses and commercial vehicles with over 100 buses, coaches, commercial vehicles and fire appliances in the collection.

Since 2005, the Trust has operated a project called 'Back on the Road' which aims to assist those with drug or alcohol addiction problems by providing work experience which will prepare them for a return to employment and society in general. The project operates in conjunction with the local addiction agencies and has been very successful.

Bridgeton Bus Garage opens to the public one Sunday per month from April to September and host an Annual Open Weekend in October. 2023 saw their biggest event yet with over 3000 visitors over the two days. Vehicles from the collection participate in events within the city and beyond, often allowing the public the opportunity to travel on the them. They are also the caretakers of a huge social history collection. The collection which is currently being catalogued consists over over 5000 objects and 160,000 photographs and other transport ephemera.
